Project DAWN Categories

Based on your registration information, you will be grouped according to the following and will be required to submit the following data by the 10th of the following month.

- **Group A:** Programs distribute more than or equal to 1,000 kits/year to the community or are current subrecipients of ODH Community Harm Reduction Grants.
- **Group B:** Programs that distribute less than 1,000 kits/year to the community.
- **Group C:** Local health departments that only provide kits to law enforcement and first responders (NOT for leave-behind programs or quick response teams). It is common for a health department to be in Group C and Group A or B. This effort was previously supported by Ohio MHAS.

Distribution, Placement, or Transfer Setting Guidance

The same kit should not be grouped in more than one setting; choose the most applicable setting based off the definitions below.

Community Access Point: Distribution via settings open to the public such as community centers, libraries, food pantries, faith-based organizations, etc.	Online Mail-order: Mailing naloxone after receiving client requests online, by phone, or other methods.
Court System: Includes distribution through probation system, drug court, or other court system.	Pharmacy: Furnishing naloxone through a pharmacy.
ED/Urgent Care: Distribution through an emergency department or urgent care setting. <u>Do not</u> use this for other hospital settings.	QRT: A quick response team that visits someone post-overdose to offer resources. The visit can be to the client's home, an ED, or other location.
FQHC/non-LHD Clinic: Distribution through a federally qualified health center or other non-local health department outpatient health clinic.	School/University: Can include K-12 schools, colleges, universities, etc.
Hospital System: Distribution through any hospital system setting <u>except</u> emergency departments and pharmacies.	Street Outreach: Distribution occurring in the community through pop-up outdoor events, door-to-door outreach, etc.
Jail/Corrections: Includes distribution via jail, community correctional facility, etc.	Syringe Service Program: Furnishing naloxone through a syringe service program.
Leave-Behind (EMS/LEO): First responders (including fire, EMS, law enforcement, etc.) furnishing naloxone after responding to an overdose either to the person who overdosed or others on the scene.	Treatment/Recovery: Includes any form of behavioral health treatment, including SUD treatment centers, mental health organizations, peer support services, group meetings, etc.
Local Health Department (LHD): Distribution from an LHD via walk-ins, scheduled individual and group trainings, etc.	Vending/Dispensing Machine: Distribution via an automated mechanism like a vending or dispensing machine.
Mobile Unit: Mobile vehicle that distributes naloxone. However, if naloxone is furnished through a mobile syringe service program, <u>do not</u> choose this setting; please categorize as 'Syringe Service Program'.	Other: Only use this option when the setting does not match any of the choices above. If distribution was through a Lay Distribution Network, please select the option where lay distribution occurred (e.g., Street Outreach)—only classify as Other if necessary.
